I don't know whether it was through your error in addressing or some other accident, but for two weeks ECHO z POLSKI [Echo from Poland] has not reached us, that is: numbers 24 and 25. Many of the Poles here are making various complaints and don't like this, while in the first week I blamed it on your being busy and after November 29th I waited patiently for the next one, but when nothing arrived by Wednesday evening, I am forced to ask you for the reason and demand that at least a few copies of each issue be sent without delay as to satisfy some of the persons here.

I am quickly sending my sincere greetings to all.

Chicago, November 3, 1863

Dear Countryman!

Today I was able to take to the pen so I can give you a better idea about things as in the past.

After receiving your last [several]letters, I used all possible ways to get the members of the Committee together, as some of them have not wanted to meet for a time. Two weeks ago five of us met and after a few days we scheduled another meeting eight days later -- alerting all the absent members in writing but were not much happier than before, for the others did not come.

That is why we elected two new members and decided to act in a group of seven. We created a commission to collect funds for Poland, and this started last Sunday working among the Poles and we collected 73.00 dollars. We divided the city into four districts, first we will visit all the Poles and later anyone we can -- among us we must do it this way and each must be approached separately as to have them aid this holy cause.

We wrote an announcement that all the papers printed for free. It is mainly addressed to the Poles but also to the friends of Poland -- perhaps among the others we will get some support, the beginning has given us more courage -- and this is what I can tell you in a hurry. At the same time I ask that you inform us if preparing for the great meeting on the 29th of this month and how -- we could, if not more, sent to you an address of a few words.

The money that comes in from this collection we will send in 15 days to your bankers -- from the subscribers only one paid so far, when I collect more I will send it immediately. I send to you my Dear Countryman and to all Poles, true sincere greetings expressing with pleasure my respect for you.

The rest I will send it as soon as I collect it. It will not be much as it will be from only three. You have sent more copies than we can pay fir but that is your fault; for from the start of this quarter I mentioned to you that more than 15 subscriptions I cannot introduce. We are trying to increase your income but unfortunately not all Poles in chicago are of one conviction and there will be those who do not come to help but try to discourage others.

As for your desire to separate the donation as to sources Polish and other, we cannot get involved in such formalities because of personal interests and we have already stated the same to Kalussowski in thus matter -- we will be sufficiently satisfied when we have a general receipt for the money sent, and that all the donors names appear in ECHO z POLSKI, while you must be satisfied with what we are able to do -- we assure you there are a sincere and honest few only, not enough, and the rest what can I say.

God we ask to witness that to each of us time is very precious - and won't dent that Chicago has not done much to date -- if we only had one at least who had the free time to work more and surely we would get ahead. Yourself you must admit that it is impossible to abandon or ignore one's own interests for the future is uncertain and when one can find himself in a critical situation.

As for organizing the Committee of foreign nations -- this we can take up only later when your committees start to work. What we are able to do, we will not lose any opportunity.

This we will need for our activities among other Irishmen. This week I sent a few letters to Iowa, Wisconsin and Michigan to the Poles who live in various places and comprise a few dozen families who have not participated in the subscription drive for the ECHO z POLSKI. I hope that in the future those from the West will be making their presence known to you. We in Chicago will not fail to do whatever we can. It is not unlikely that the endurance of those fighting in Poland will influence even the most impenetrable souls which most of the Poles in Chicago seem to have and we hope that with each week people will take on a better conviction [attitude] toward this matter and at the same time make things easier for us.

The rest I will try to get as soon as I can and send it immediately. On this occasion I must inform you about the death of one of our countrymen, Antoni Jezierski finished his life on the 19th of this month. His end was a sad sight. He was a man alone, ill without care, and was reaching the limit of his strength to save himself, without avail -- the day before his death he was taken to the hospital where he bade farewell to this world. He was born in Wloclawek and aged about 35. He has a brother in Brzesc Kujawski and that is all I cal tell about him. The little money he had and some items he gave to for distribution to Józef Potanski, as the closest of his friends.

ECHO z POLSKI arrives on a very irregular basis and we ask that you not forget to send it right after it is printed. The Polish Committee in Chicago sent to the "Irish National Fair" a present [consisting of] a portrait of Irish patriot Daniel O'Connoll [O'Connell] in a beautiful gold frame with an accompanying letter and greetings.

Please accept an assurance of my good will and true respect.

Chicago, March 31, 1864

Dear Countryman.

I am attaching two clippings from the "Chicago Times" that mention Poland in the current event or the "Irish National Fair." After conveying our gift to the Society of the Brotherhood, the Polish Committee was in particular invited to the Banquet organized by the Fenian Brotherhood on the day of the fair's opening. The 6th toast was raised to Poland and the Polish Central Committee, which was answered by citizen Jozef Majeski. The Polish Committee, if it had not done anything more in Chicago then at least it ate and drank well at a good dinner at the cost of the current politics.

I hope you will not think the worst of me if I ask where the next funds for the Polish cause should be sent, for I have not seen any clear proclamations -- true, that we have only some tens of dollars, but if it has to be [sent] then we'd like to be sure how the future arrangement is to be. I was twice attacked in writing by the Illustrious Count Kalussowski, who was imposing totally unnecessary formalities which did not apply to our group. I answered him in a very delicate way what the Committee in Chicago decided -- and he was much offended -- then started the attack in writing, but it is all done now. But privately Mr. Kalussowski wrote to one Pole, Zalewski, answering some questions regarding the invention of weapons [?], about which you most likely know, then he started to complain about the Committee in Chicago and the Central Committee in New York, and in the end wrote that he handed in his resignation which he expects [acceptance of] any day. This action by Kalussowski I see as childish, something that a most hysterical woman would do. The one he wrote to never had a relationship with him and did not know him. In addition, Zalewski never participated in any action on behalf the Polish cause, he only has his trade business which he promotes the same way as his patriotism. It was unnecessary to broadcast these things to people who have no interest [stake] in it. In New York you [plural] must have had some misunderstandings, as I can see, but I hope in the future all will be well, because agreement among ourselves and work together will now be more necessary, the latest news from Europe are very favorable.

I always am not afraid to write sincerely to you, my respected countryman and friend

If you would enjoy it I will send you copies of my arguments with Kalussowski and you will see from it all that he was not right.

Chicago, April 4, [18]64

Dear Countryman.

You must forgive me that I am pestering you with letters which may not be to your liking while you are busy, but let me tell you that your slowness in publishing the ECHO in the last weeks has set us back in our activities with the Poles in the West, that we started and with a good beginnings forecasted -- so your paper is not all that necessary -- but it would surely be useful if it was popular to write for the peasants [farmers] of whom there are many in Wisconsin, Michigan and Iowa. The patriotic element among them has begun to awake for from five today I received 24 dollars for the Polish cause and 250 dollars for subscriptions to the ECHO. They replied straight from their farms to the announcement that I sent them two weeks earlier. If there are some difficulties in printing the ECHO and you will be a few days late, then it would be best if in such circumstance you could put a few words in the mail about the reasons for it, for now we have not received anything for two weeks.

In the future send three copies of the ECHO to the address of Andreas Kosowski, Brighton, Iowa -- and when I learn from you about what is going on with you, here the organization is presently set up and I will send the money immediately.

I repeat my plea to be forgiven for my insistence but I am speaking in our common interest and not just for myself.

Dear Jaworowski!

I have received your last letter -- in this moment, my time is fully occupied to such an extent that I cannot take up any matter except for keeping myself in order. For a month now I have moved to a new place at No. 229 Lake Street where I will run a business by myself, before I put everything in order it will cost me much time and work -- only when I am ready I will devote some time to communicating with you. Now I can only reply to your two main questions, that is -- as for the Photographs, for a start you can send me no more than five, and if someone wants more then I will let you know, so that it would not be as with the songbooks of which 40 are still lying around and I don't know what to do with them, as the Poles are unwilling to buy them. As for a Pole who is a pharmacist, we don't have one in Chicago only one assistant and he is the son of a Pole, but speaks no Polish, his name is Blocki.
